It was a pleasure to talk with you on January 5, 2000 about your interest in joining the Department of Psychiatry, University of Toronto at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health. As we discussed, you academic rank would be as a Full Professor in the Department of Psychiatry, and you would also have the title of Clinical Director for the Mood and Anxiety Disorders Program at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health.

As Clinical Director, you would work closely with the Administrative Director, who is currently Ms. Christina Bartha in managing this Program, which is currently an ambulatory program based at the Clarke site with four main clinical research units - Anxiety Disorders, Bipolar, Cognitive Behaviour Therapy and Depression. As you know from your visits, there is a strong emphasis on integrating clinical, research and educational activities in all of these units. The Clinical Director tends to take responsibility for academic activities, while the Administrative Director manages budgetary and personnel issues. As a Professor of Psychiatry, you would continue to develop your scholarly work and would be expected to make contributions in the areas of research and teaching.

With regard to personal funding, you would receive the University minimum for rank equivalent of \$64,000 together with an administrative stipend of \$25,000 as Clinical Director. Based on a rough approximation of 25 hours per week of clinical contact, you would earn an additional \$110,000. Further incentives based on academic productivity, which can be as high as \$30,000 per year, are awarded at the end of each year. Royalties from book sales are not considered part of declared professional income and are held outside of the Associates' Business Office. Generally the expense ratio for partners is 8-9% of gross earnings. A rough calculation suggests that you could expect to earn in the region of \$220,000 to \$250,000 per annum depending on the amount of clinical and other professional income generated. One-time expenses such as moving expenses would be

My name is Nancy Zettler. I represent the Estate of Charles Berman in a lawsuit against Eli Lilly. I was also one of the Lawyers on the Fentress case and tried the case against Lilly with Paul Smith in 1994.

It has come to our attention that you had what one could say was an interesting conversation with Dr. David Healy at a meeting on July 17th. I am writing to invite you to meet with David and me so that we can show you the other side of the coin, so to speak.

We know that you have had a longstanding association with Lilly and I'm sure that you are in a difficult position, but are you sure that you really have all the facts? David mentioned that you told him that you looked at Lilly's database. Are you sure? If so, are you confident that the data was generated, gathered, interpreted and reported appropriately? Are you comfortable acting as a mouthpiece for a company that on one occasion was censured by the FDA for failing to accurately report adverse events to the FDA and on another occasion pled guilty to fraud charges for being less than honest with the FDA about reporting of serious adverse events, including deaths, in its clinical trials?

I feel comfortable writing to you because I do not believe that you have been hired as a witness or consultant in the *Berman* case, or any other case in which David Healy is testifying. I know this because if you had been, you would have been instructed by the party employing you that it is inappropriate under the rules (at least here in Illinois) to contact a witness and try to influence their testimony.

Dr. Nemeroff, you have an excellent reputation and are widely respected in your field and we have no problem with spirited scientific debate - you are entitled to your opinion, right

or wrong. But, we would appreciate it if you would limit your contact with our witnesses to spirited scientific debate and refrain from veiled threats. After all, Dr. Healy is entitled to his opinion also, is he not?

If you are really interested in knowing the entire truth about this drug, call me. I'd be happy to show you the evidence that we have. There is a lot of it. If you are working directly or indirectly for Lilly or some other drug company and in that capacity confronted David Healy at the meeting, please do not do so again. Aside from compromising your integrity, you would be doing something that may very well be illegal.

Dear John:

A couple of incidences have come to our attention that are, frankly, quite disturbing.

First, David Healy was approached and verbally accosted at a recent psychiatric conference in the UK by non other than Charles Nemeroff. Dr. Nemeroff made some not-so-veiled references to the health of Dr. Healy's reputation and career and his opinions regarding SSRIs. He flat out stated to Dr. Healy that he had been approached to testify against Dr. Healy in "4 or 5" cases and that "drug companies can make your life miserable". Considering that it is well known that Dr. Nemeroff has long been on your client's "payroll," it doesn't take a great leap in logic to figure out where Dr. Nemeroff got his motivation to approach Dr. Healy.

Second, Dr. Healy received an E-mail from someone purporting to be a "pharmaceutical representative for Eli Lilly & Co." who allegedly works in Norfolk, Virginia area. This person's name is Jim Butler.

We would appreciate it if you would tell your client that it is inappropriate for them to contact Dr. Healy outside the deposition context, especially in the context of Dr. Nemeroff's veiled threats. While it is hard for me to believe that you of all people would proffer or even condone such actions, it is becoming increasingly hard to ignore these inappropriate contacts. One more such contact and we will take the issue to Judge Larsen.

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
Is the Brash and Controversial Charles Nemeroff the Most Powerful Man in hiatry?

Boss of Bosses Charles B. Nemeroff, MD, PhD

Charlie Nemeroff is sitting quietly at the speaker's table, ignoring the bustle going on around him. His face betrays nothing-neither boredom, nor interest, or apprehension. Only the blinking of his eyes distinguish him from a statue. When he hears his name he rises very slowly, and begins to move to the lectern with deliberate strides, gathering speed as he goes, brightening now. He breaks into a grin and begins speaking the minute he approaches the microphone and, before the hush of the room takes hold, he has won the crowd with a disarming and deliberate manner that curs simply to the heart of the most complex issues in neuropsychiatry.

Charles B. Nemeroff, MD, PhD. chairman of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Emory University School of Medicine in Atlanta, finds himself addressing a room of crowded colleagues hundreds of times each year. Even in the ultra-competitive world of medicine and academia, Nemeroff is admittedly the most covered academic speaker in psychiatry in the United States. His prolific authorship (he has published 600 research reports and reviews) along with a sheer enorunity of research grants, awards, and scientific board appointments, has afforded him unprecedented celebrity within the psychiatric community.

Nemeroff's academic and intellectual largess translates to a small and influential group of close friends, including fellow department chartmen Alan Schatzberg (Stanford), Marry Keller (Brown), Dwight Evans (U. Penn), Beh Hirschfeld (U. of Texas, Galveston) and NIMH heavyweight Dennis Charney, all of whom spend a great deal of professional and personal time together. Psychiatry is a highly charged topic these days, and these six thought leaders

walk a fine line between controversy and political correctness, often made possible by their strong allegiances both to topics and to one another.

The ethics surrounding the implementation of placebo-control trials is one of psychiatry's most super-charged political issues, as is addressed in more detail in this issue of TEN. "From a scientific point of view, the best data on efficacy of any treatment is best derived from placeho-controlled trials," Nemeroff says. But with diseases like cancer and stroke, placebo trials become unethical. Thus, "the FDA in most cases has allowed for comparison between novel treatments for devastating disorders with traditional already-approved treatments." If a novel agent proves efficacious aguinst en existing agent, it gets approved. But "that has not been the case in psychiatry. And we have to raise questions alout the use of placebo in conditions like mania, where patients are terribly ill. [In these cases] one wonders why it isn't sufficient to have evaluation based on 'just-as-good-as' or 'hetter-than' currently available treatments and better side effect profile."

Nemeroff is among the most coveted advisors to the pharmaceutical industry. Predictably, rumors about his alliances, or lack thereof, abound. It is safe to say that his views are expressed in a forceful manner—he is a passionate person—and he fully expects to lead the corporate strategy of those he advises. Thisse who do not heed his advice are often recipients of his wrath. Consequently, Nemeroff is often in favor with the most successful drog makers, since those firms are doing the hours share of research, which he often directs.

Privately, Nemeroff is circumspect about the role between private and public funding. Working with industry can "be a win-win. There is a shared vision but also



separate mission. The university mission is a troika: research, teaching, clinical service; whereas the pharmaceutical industry [mission is to] discover new drugs and to market them effectively. Sometimes those goals are simpatico and sometimes they're not." As an example of a situation where industry funding works to the benefit of the scientific community. Nemeroff recounts a new teaching council that he started recently with a grant from Janssen called The Young Faculty Development Program, where young professors get the opportunity to learn about clinical issues and academic life. And he talks also about the differences he sees between today's young clinicians and those of his generation. "In the past, there was a clear schism between psychoanalytically oriented psychiatrists and so-called biological psychiatrists. Today, this mindframe dualism seems silly...Patients of course have both minds and brains." The fact of the matter is that psychosocial factors...can certainly affect how the brain functions and we also know that the brain itself changes. The nature/nurture controversy is really no controversy, as we've improved our understanding of the brain.

The Bronx-NY-born Nemeroff is most content being both a researcher and a physician. As an example, he recounts a part of the very day of this phone interview "[Earlier today] I saw four patients, one on emergency consult; at the same time, I was dealing with a number of issues related to an NIMH grant of the psychobiology of early trauma. What can be better than being a teacher and a researcher and a physician?" •


